

History

- 1850 Land purchased by the state to build North Carolina's first psychiatric hospital
- 1856 First patient admitted
- 2002 NC DHHS officials announce that Dorothea Dix Mental Hospital will close by end of 2008
- 2003 North Carolina legislature pass bill to build a new state psychiatric hospital in Butner, N.C.
- 2004 Friends of Dorothea Dix Park begins to organize
- 2007 General Assembly to decide the best use of the property



What is a "Destination Park"?

- Central Park in New York, Millennium Park in Chicago, Piedmont Park in Atlanta
- Backyard for downtown
- Haven in the middle of chaos
- Place to escape the city
- Place for families to take children
- Place for entertainment, recreation, exercise
- Brings in new people and money
- Provides connectivity to other parks through greenways



FDDP Park Plan



- Preserves open space and historic landmarks
- Will have a significant economic impact
- Development *outside* the park
- Enhances downtown development
- Promotes connectivity
- Presents several financing options
- Honors legacy of hospital
- Is the best comprehensive use of all 306 acres
